Calch's Story

Ten year-old Caleb has always been a little bit in his own world, according to his mum, Michelle. Like many young boys, he likes to listen to music, sing and go swimming, but he is not able to do these things independently like other children his age. Caleb has lost his sight, requires the use of a wheelchair and remains under the care and review of multiple medical disciplines, professionals and hospitals, and will need lifelong medication.

At four months old, Caleb was diagnosed with Osteopetrosis – a rare disorder whereby bones harden – which caused him to lose his sight completely and to develop Hydrocephalus, causing significant brain damage. Just five months later he underwent a bone marrow transplant, his older sister being a donor match.

The transplant was eventually successful, but Caleb was left with profound and multiple learning difficulties,

severe development delay, physical limitations, a gastrostomy and blindness. Aged four, he was also diagnosed with Autism and minor problems with his ears and digestion.

The family started receiving support from the Leo House community care team when they moved to Brighton a few years ago, and they quickly found that it made a massive difference to their lives.

When Caleb receives visits at home from a nurse, it allows his parents, Michelle and Matt, to spend some quality time with his older sister, Scarlett, and together as a couple. Mostly, this is something simple like going out for a meal, walking the dog, or going to the cinema or beach, but these are all things that are difficult or impossible when Caleb is with them.

"I honestly don't know what we'd do without our community nurse," says Michelle. "The support we receive enables us to take a breather, and relax in the knowledge that Caleb is safe and well cared for."

Michelle sums it up by saying, "The



support we receive makes such a huge difference to our lives – it makes us feel less alone and more able to cope with whatever life throws at us."
